Focused: ICM commits to finding and helping the ultrapoor.

- The ultrapoor are those who live on less than US\$0.50 per person per day.
- Among ICM participants, 32% of mothers have had a child die.

Effective: ICM invests in evidence-based strategies.

- After *Transform*, ultrapoor participants report a 106% increase in income, 28% decrease in illness and 42% increase in self-worth.

Efficient: ICM stretches every dollar to achieve maximum impact and scale.

- The fully loaded cost per family member is US\$10.
- 1,000,000+ family members have benefitted from *Transform* since 2009.

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ICM's Focus: Those Living in Ultrapoverty

The Philippines is home to more than 101 million people. Despite economic growth in recent years, 22 million Filipinos still live below the national poverty line. Farthest below that line, in the most severe form of poverty, are seven million people living in ultrapoverty where their survival is at risk. ICM focuses on helping families who live in ultrapoverty, those who live on less than US\$0.50 per person per day.

Life with Little Hope

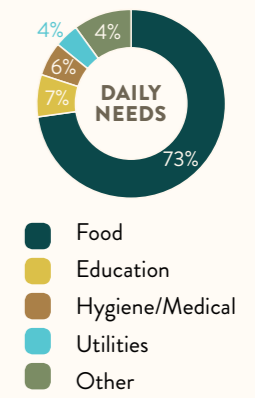
Families living in ultrapoverty face an everyday struggle to find enough income to meet daily needs. Mothers make impossible decisions every day. Do I feed my children or do I pay their school fees? Do I buy soap or pay the electricity bill?



ICM's goal for families in ultrapoverty is financial stability, so each day is a good day: three meals a day, children in school, bills paid and money saved for the future.

A recent ICM study to understand typical consumption habits of ultrapoor families found what we expected: the numbers don't add up. Families told us what they spent on good days. But most days are not "good days." And on those days, something has to give.

Delivering Hope

ICM finds and serves families in ultrapoverty no matter where they live

The Philippines' poorest families live on the margins of society, often in isolated areas scattered across the country's 7,000 islands. In almost every one of these dispersed mountain, coastal, plain and urban villages is a small Filipino church. And the pastors in those communities share ICM's mission—to help vulnerable families break free from the bondages of poverty.

ICM's network of more than 6,247 pastors across the central and southern Philippines gives ICM the unique ability to reach those living in ultrapoverty no matter where they live.

"The church is a network that links people in every country, every social or ethnic group, and every economic strata together. . . . I could take you to millions of villages around the world where the only civil institution that exists there is a local church. 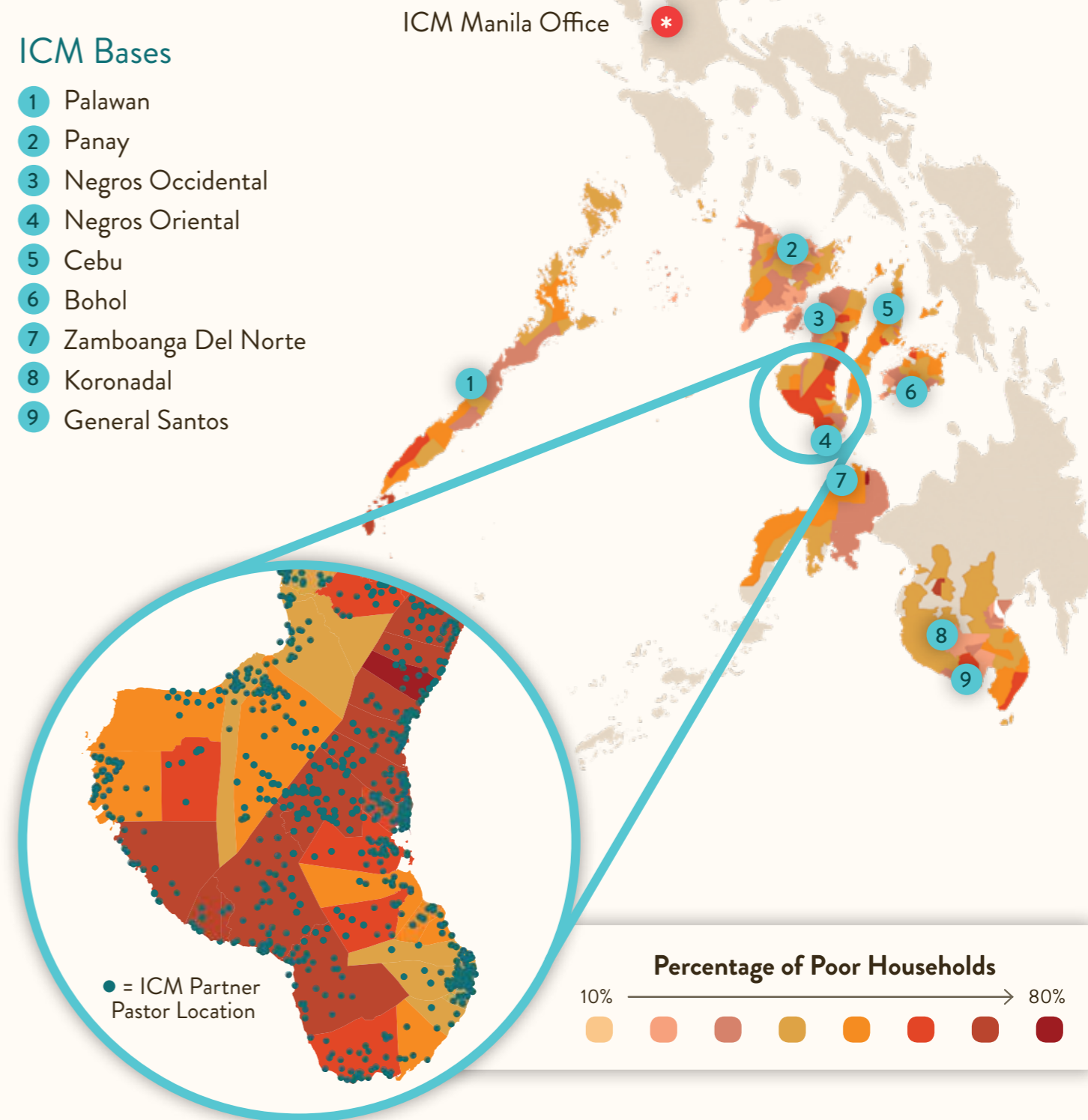

Case Study: Hope Sustained

One community's journey to sustainable transformation

Since 2014, Pastor Joel has graduated 134 families through ICM's *Transform* program, delivering positive impact to 670 family members from his poor village. Encouraged by the impact, Pastor Joel has hosted *Transform* five times, inviting different ultrapoor families each time. Three savings groups continue to save and invest in new business activities, including a small grocery store. Many new businesses have started. Fourteen children have been cured of malnutrition. One child received a life-saving operation. And to top it all off, Pastor Joel's church has quadrupled in size as people are attracted to the way he and his congregation share love in action to those around them.



The community where Pastor Joel lives is one of extreme poverty. Regular flooding makes every day a challenge. Many are unemployed, and the crime rate is high. Life is hard and hope is scarce. Called to serve the poor around him, Pastor Joel joined ICM's Thrive Pastor Network in 2012 when he learned that ICM shared his passion to help the poor.

THRIVE

ICM's ability to reach those in ultrapovertry is only possible through partnerships with thousands of pastors who serve in slums across the Philippines. Monthly Thrive meetings equip pastors to bring tangible help to the poor they live among and serve.

In 2014, shortly after Typhoon Haiyan, Pastor Joel hosted his first *Transform* program to help those in dire need. The 25 graduating families were able to rebuild their homes destroyed by the storm. Every year since then, Pastor Joel has hosted additional *Transforms* in his community with prior graduating participants joining as volunteers.

TRANSFORM

Every year, ICM runs *Transform* in more than 1,000 communities like Pastor Joel's. Pastors (and church members) give their time, meeting places and passion to serve. ICM staff members bring holistic training and resources to unlock the bondages of poverty.

Our Research Shows...

In 2017–2018, groundbreaking research on the impact of ICM's programs was covered in *The Economist* and *New York Times* after being published in the *National Bureau of Economic Research*. The published research showed the release of the midline results of a large-scale, randomized controlled trial on ICM's *Transform* program. The research is encouraging, showing concrete evidence of *Transform*'s impact on poverty. The poor families in ICM's *Transform* program earned more income than families who received no program. Other poverty-related measures improved as well, such as grit and better hygiene practices.

ICM is committed to the rigorous testing and measuring of all aspects of operations, and we are pleased to see measurable proof of *Transform*'s impact.



As a part of *Transform*, participants form savings groups that continue to meet every week. In Pastor Joel's community, three savings groups have formed since 2014 and are working together to run a grocery store in their village. Profits are shared among members, and they also have a pool of capital available for loans.

PREVAIL

Monthly Prevail meetings for savings group leaders provide ongoing training from ICM to empower sustainable economic growth. As savings groups mature, Prevail helps them to achieve greater financial inclusion in the economic activities of their communities.

Wanting to share their success with others in need, in 2017 members of Pastor Joel's *Transform* savings group volunteered to lead *Transform 2*. The experienced graduates became health and livelihood trainers, confidently sharing their new skills to help others embark on their same journey toward positive change.

TRANSFORM 2

ICM desires to see empowered communities with sustained transformation. *Transform 2* is a pilot program that empowers local pastors and *Transform* graduates to run their own program with minimal input from ICM.

Hope that transforms

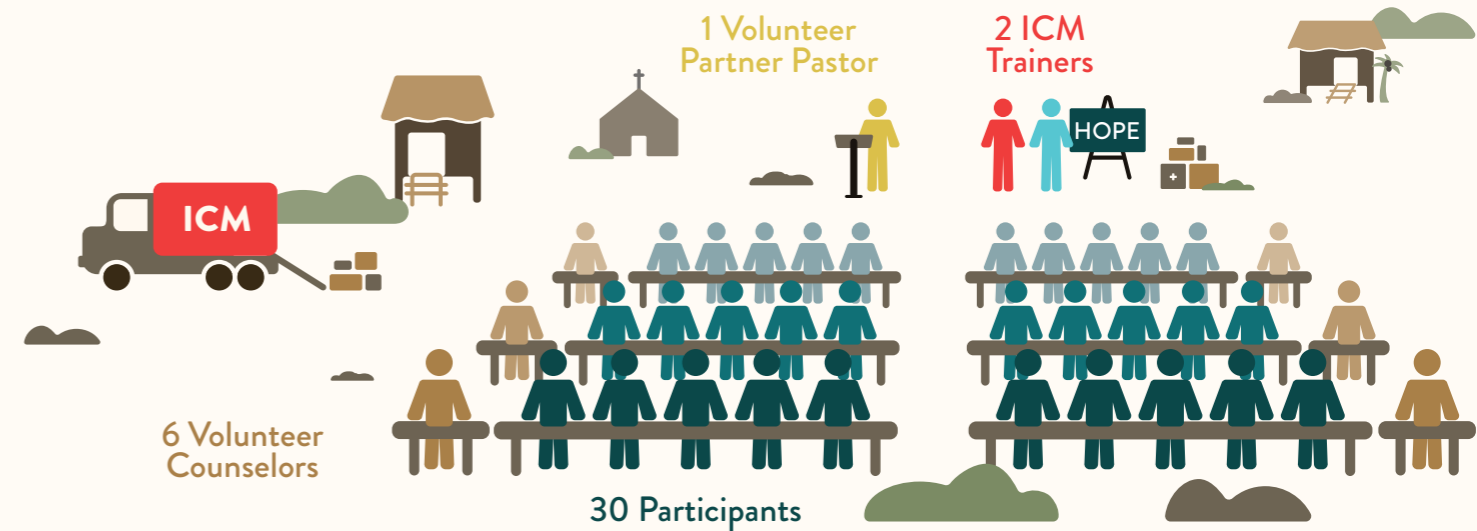
Hope is the key. Progress out of poverty must start with the belief that a better future is possible.

Most people ICM works with have known poverty their entire lives. Having grown up with parents and grandparents who were poor, they fully expect that they and their children will be poor. Not realizing their lives can be better through their own actions, a sense of hopelessness traps people in a cycle of poverty. But if people come to understand that they can be agents for change in their own lives, a light bulb turns on, aspirational hope comes alive and people make progress toward a better future.

Transform is ICM’s core strategy for igniting hope that propels change. The first step is to gather the people who need help the most. A local pastor, using a poverty scorecard, invites the poorest families from his or her community to join *Transform*, a holistic education course that delivers support, training and resources that rekindle the hope of a better future.

Once weekly, for four months, ICM *Transform* trainers join the pastor and community volunteers to teach the interactive curriculum. As participants apply lessons learned, they realize that small changes in attitudes, in savings, in health practices and in parenting accumulate over time to achieve significant change and progress out of poverty.

Empowering Women

One of the best ways to foster economic growth among the poor is to empower underserved women for greater productivity. Among the poor in the Philippines, women not only are the primary caregivers of children but they also assume the majority share of housework. When a woman's life improves, everyone in the household benefits.

By design, all of ICM's programs work to build up marginalized women so they feel empowered to effect change in their own lives, the lives of their families and their communities. ICM does this by:

- creating safe support networks where women can encourage each other
- inspiring entrepreneurialism among women with business training and low-risk livelihood opportunities
- improving the standing of women in their communities as they start new businesses in their homes
- providing new leadership roles for women
- addressing the health issues of women and families

Evangeline, in the photo above, is an example of how *Transform* empowers women toward greater confidence and productivity. As she began applying the simple lessons learned each week, she was amazed by what she could do. She now runs a store from her home, her children are healthy and are eating three meals a day and she has savings for the first time in her life! So encouraged by the life-change she has experienced, Evangeline is now teaching others what she has learned by helping to lead additional *Transform* programs in her community.

Hope Starts with the HEART

Fostering positive values and strong relationships

ICM's values curriculum helps people who have lived their whole lives in poverty to overcome feelings of inferiority and passivity that hold them back. Presented from a Biblical worldview and taught by the local partner pastor, the optional values training leads to:

- Greater respect for self and others
- Stronger relationships
- More confident choices
- Aspirational hope

Communities of Hope

Among the ultrapoor, a lack of social connectedness is a key stronghold preventing progress out of poverty. Because what we do is often contingent on the behavior of others, local social networks are extremely important. One's community exerts influence on identity, aspirations, decision-making and behavior.

Transform forges multi-layered communities of support for participants, thus providing opportunities for cooperative friendships to develop and hope to grow.

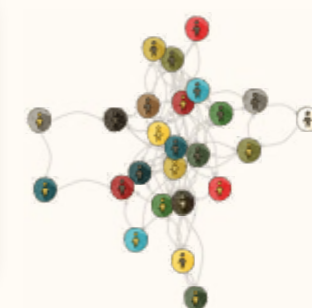

Hope Grows with OPPORTUNITY

Empowering sustainable livelihoods and lifelong savings

Families will never get out of poverty without reliable and sufficient income. *Transform*'s livelihood curriculum empowers women to earn more money and save for the future. In poor communities across the Philippines, women usually bear the primary responsibility for childcare and household chores. ICM empowers women (who comprise 90% of *Transform* participants) to contribute to their household incomes by running small businesses from their homes.

By setting achievable weekly goals, participants can experiment with new livelihoods at low risk. As they experience entrepreneurial success they never thought possible, confidence grows and sustainable livelihoods become a reality.

Transform's livelihood lessons focus on three key areas:

Small Business Skills

Rolling Capital, Marketing, Vision

Livelihood Options

Snacks, Cleaning Products, Organic Vegetables

Savings Groups

Record Keeping, Banking, Loans

Business-in-a-Box Microloans

Many living in poverty don't believe they could ever start a small business. ICM's Business-in-a-Box (BIB) starter kits show them how. With over 20 low-capital home-based small business options to choose from, *Transform* participants can try out new ways to earn income at low risk. BIB kits are in-kind microloans containing all the raw materials needed to try out a new business. And Garden-in-a-Box kits equip families to grow vegetables organically for consumption and resale.

Savings Groups

Lack of access to financial services keeps families trapped in poverty. During *Transform*, participants form informal, self-governed savings groups, with each participant saving what she can, sometimes as little as US\$0.10 per week. But the savings add up: by the end of *Transform*, most groups have saved nearly US\$50. The savings groups provide a secure place to save, the opportunity to borrow money on flexible terms and capital for group businesses.

Our Research Shows...

Midline data from ICM's large-scale randomized controlled trial of more than 6,000 people consistently showed that households who benefited from *Transform* earned more income than those who received no program. This data was collected six months after the conclusion of *Transform*. ICM will soon publish the results from the endline study, which was completed two years after the program's conclusion.



Partly deaf since childhood, Cherry Mae struggled to earn enough to keep her son (and herself) fed and sheltered. The odd jobs she did to survive brought in a meager US\$0.62 per day. She relied on the generosity of others to survive.

Cherry Mae was delighted to join *Transform* and started a business selling cakes. She now makes hundreds of cakes every day and is earning a daily profit of US\$12. Her income is now 15 times more than what she lived on before!

Hope Endures in the **PHYSICAL**

Promoting healthy living

Poverty is both a cause and a consequence of poor health. Unsafe homes, insufficient food and poor sanitation increase vulnerability to sickness. Poor physical health, in turn, limits one's ability to earn consistent income. One medical crisis can wipe out any progress made in the fight out of poverty.

ICM's health training works to break this cycle by educating poor families on ways to prevent sickness, improve nutrition and increase family well-being.

In addition to *Transform's* health training, ICM also addresses individual medical concerns of poor families. Common health issues such as diarrhea and parasites are treated with Medical Treatment Packs and follow-up care. Clinically malnourished children receive extra nutrition support and monitoring as part of a home-based feeding treatment plan. Pregnant women receive a baby-care pack and assistance in registering with their local health clinic.

Transform's health lessons focus on three key areas:

John Mark's bloated stomach, bulging eyes and sallow skin were clear signs of clinical malnutrition. After enrolling in ICM's home-based feeding program, John Mark not only gained weight, but he also transformed into a playful boy with a beautiful smile!

"Because of ICM, I am a better mom! I've learned the importance of breastfeeding and taking care of myself and my baby." Recently widowed Hanna was pregnant with her fourth child when she joined *Transform*. She gave birth to a healthy baby boy in May.

Our Research Shows...

Tuberculosis is a serious health problem in the Philippines. As a part of *Transform*, ICM screens participants for TB and refers suspect cases to the local health clinic for further assessment and treatment. ICM is in the midst of a study to determine how to increase the number of participants who actually go to clinics for testing. Preliminary results indicate that minor transport subsidies and food incentives may measurably increase the clinic visit rate.



Hope Advances through EDUCATION

Launching confident learners

Children raised in extreme poverty face overwhelming challenges that put their education and their futures at continual risk. Like their parents before them, they are unlikely to graduate from high school or, in many cases, even elementary school. Parents must cope with the chronic stress of providing for their families. As a result, they are distracted from prioritizing the important relationship with their children. They also doubt they can contribute anything to their children's learning journey.

Studies have shown, however, that one of the most powerful ways to improve a child's future opportunity for success is to change the attitudes, beliefs and behaviors of their parents. Two separate long-term studies provide evidence that teaching parents to play with their children during early childhood results in a host of positive changes in the lives of the children and the whole family. Right away, families reported better home environments. As the children progressed through school, they showed improved cognitive ability, reduced chance of dropping out of school and 25% higher math and reading scores than their non-participating peers. By age 22, the treatment group was earning 25% more income than peers who didn't receive the treatment in early childhood.

The new training component of *Transform*, an early childhood education strategy we call Family Academy, provides coaching to mothers and fathers to empower them to take part in their children's education through play. Using colorful math and phonics flashcards and a library of interactive games, parents become their children's first teachers. While still a young program, we are already seeing positive changes in both the attitudes and expectations of parents for their children as well as the preparedness of children for kindergarten. We are seeing hope grow for the future through education.

Prevail Savings Network

After *Transform*, ICM continues to support newly-formed savings groups with monthly Prevail meetings for additional training and accountability.

Savings groups provide members a secure place to save, the opportunity to borrow money on flexible terms and basic insurance for emergencies. The 15–30 people in a self-governed group will pool their weekly deposits to provide loans to members for individual and group entrepreneurial activity. Interest paid on loans increases the loan fund and provides profits which are shared among the members at the end of a savings cycle.

As savings groups mature, Prevail helps them to achieve even greater financial inclusion in the economic activity in their communities. Some groups register as formal cooperatives, some access government grants, some sign up for mobile money accounts and some qualify for larger microfinance loans with other organizations.

Medical Mercy Program

One medical crisis can wipe out any progress in the fight against ultrapoverly by stopping parents from working, isolating people due to stigma and trapping families in huge debt from high medical costs.

ICM's Medical Mercy Fund provides life-saving and life-changing treatment and support to the ultrapoor.

Treatment: From a few cents for simple medications to thousands of dollars for a complicated surgery, every case is unique and is carefully managed. Cases are overseen by a Medical Advisory Board to ensure appropriate care.

Support: We provide personalized patient care that maintains the dignity of families in need. Each patient is assigned a caseworker who arranges and attends all medical appointments, helps explain the diagnosis and treatment plan, and conducts home visits before, during and after treatment.



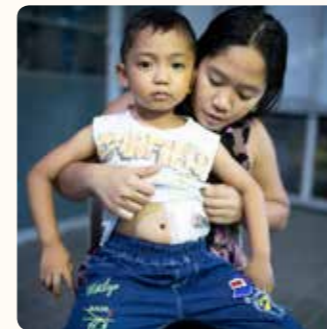

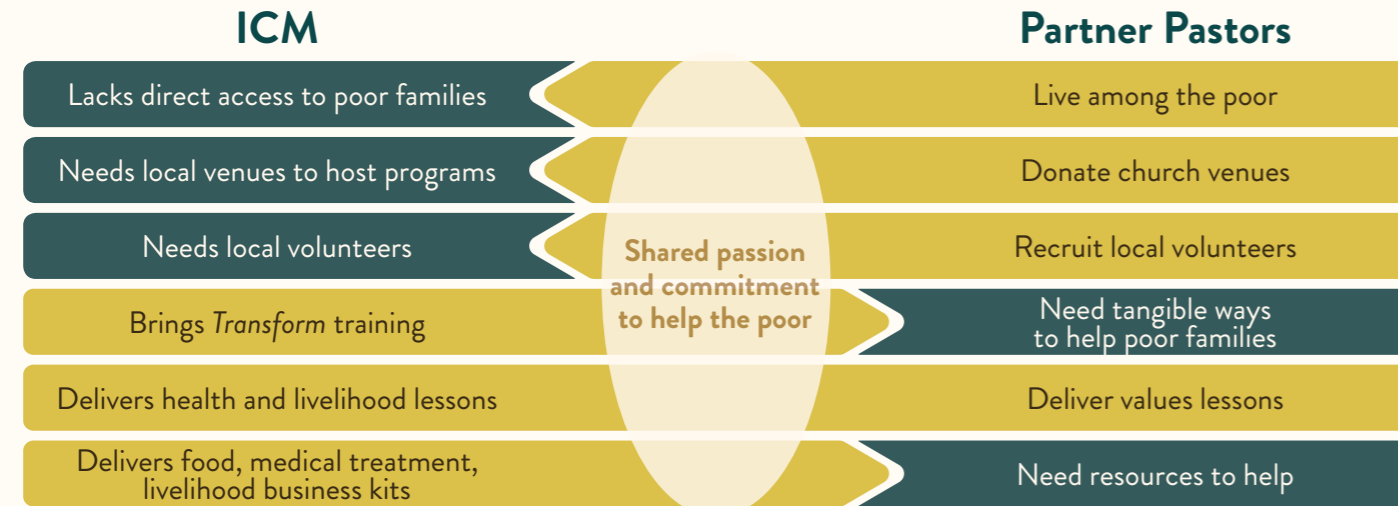

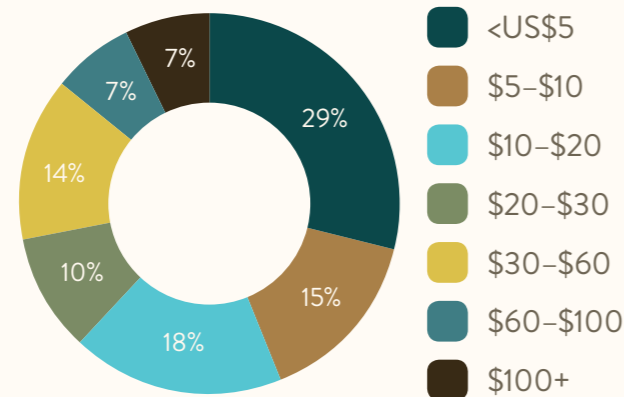

In June 2018, ICM celebrated the graduation of 5,574 pastors from a two-year theological training course delivered by ICM in partnership with six respected seminary training organizations. Of the graduating pastors, 2,211 earned certificates of completion and 3,363 received certificates of participation.



Measuring Hope

Commitment to effectiveness means dedication to data

MONITORING

ICM tracks everything that happens on the ground.

ICM keeps detailed records of program implementation including food distributed, medicines dispersed and homes visited.

Over the past 26 years, ICM has grown tremendously, from one small outreach in a church in Bacolod to nine operational bases serving 23 provinces across the Visayas and Mindanao through partnerships with more than 6,000 churches.

This past year, ICM is proud to have reached the significant milestone of bringing 'Hope that Transforms' to our one-millionth family member through our core *Transform* program.

ICM's vision for the future is three-fold.

DEEPER IMPACT

One of ICM's core values is innovation. We believe that we can always do better tomorrow than we did yesterday. Going forward, ICM remains committed to improving our effectiveness and efficiency.

Effectiveness: By piloting, researching and implementing the strategies found to be effective, ICM ensures that it is delivering the highest impact possible to those we serve.

Efficiency: ICM's new decentralized regional office structure allows staff to develop closer relationships with local leaders in distant provinces while also lowering costs.

THE NEXT MILLION

ICM's aspiration is to reach the next million by our 30th anniversary in 2023. The majority of the Philippines' ultrapoor families live scattered across the country's 7,000 islands in geographically-dispersed and hard-to-reach areas. Reaching them means going to where they live.

Reaching the next million is achievable by establishing new regional offices that allow ICM to saturate the whole of the Visayas (Central Philippines) by 2021 and Mindanao (Southern Philippines) by 2023.

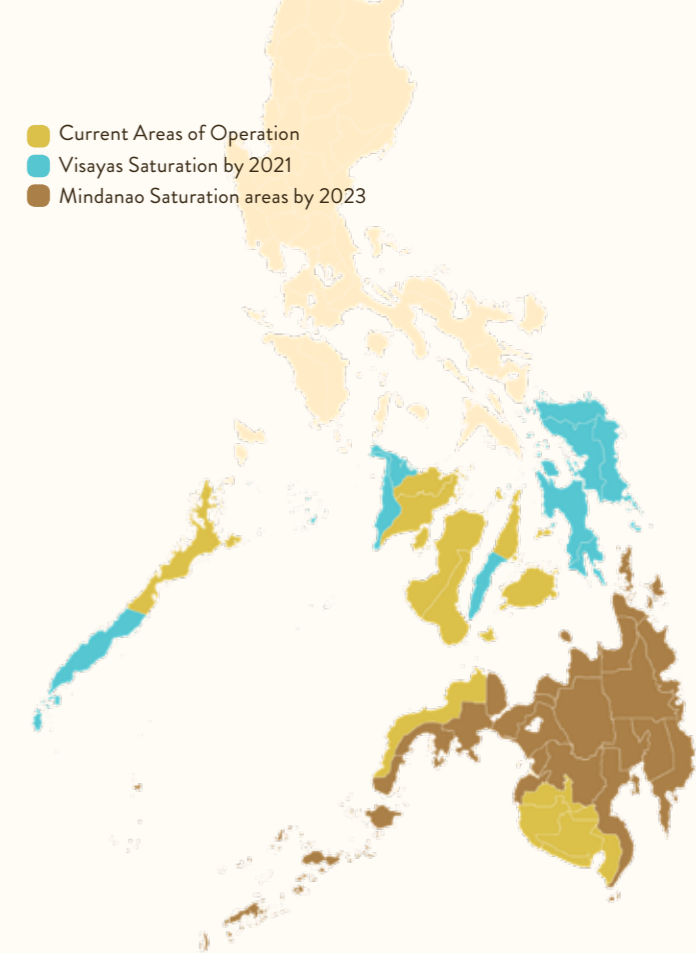
GOING GLOBAL

In 2017–2018, ICM’s budget was US\$8.6M, and our actual expenses were US\$7.2M. This 16% decrease versus budget was due primarily to a reduction in donated food of US\$1.2M and the depreciation of the Philippine Peso against the US Dollar.

ICM expects to reach 229,000 people in 2018–2019. This is a 358% increase from our reach of 50,000 people just nine years ago (2009–2010).

These pages consolidate the results of two ICM Philippine charities (ICM Foundation Inc. and ICM Manila Inc.) as well as certain costs incurred overseas which relate directly to Philippine operations. These pages exclude other costs from Hong Kong and the USA. Non Philippine costs are supported by designated donations (including banquet tables, tangible auction items, donations from the Board of Directors, and grants from three foundations), allowing virtually all other donations to go straight to the Philippines.

In 2018–2019, ICM’s budget is US\$10.0M, up 39% from the previous year’s actual results of US\$7.2M. More than 80% of this increase is driven by the use of donated food (US\$2.1M), the continued depreciation of the peso (US\$0.4M) and the opening of new branches in Northern Cebu, Southern Palawan and Antique province in Panay (US\$0.2M).

The value of donated food distributed in 2017–2018 was US\$2.7M. ICM expects to distribute food valued at US\$4.8M in 2018–2019. ICM expects to reach 229,000 people in 2018–2019 while reducing its program support expense to 4% of its Philippine expenses.

ICM’s financial statements in the Philippines are audited by SGV & Co., the largest Philippine accounting firm and an affiliate of Ernst & Young LLP. All of ICM’s audited financial statements from the Philippines, Hong Kong and the USA are available on request. ICM’s books are open to our donors. Any questions about our finances? Just ask.

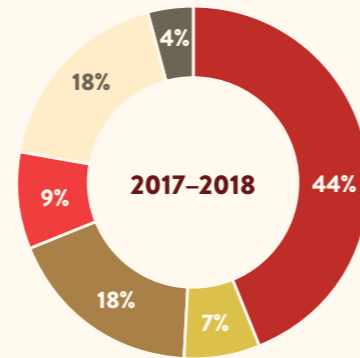
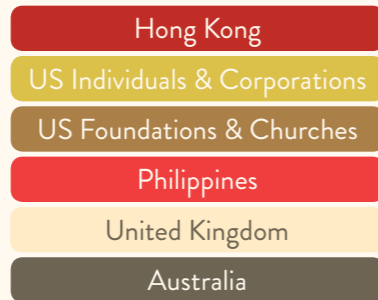
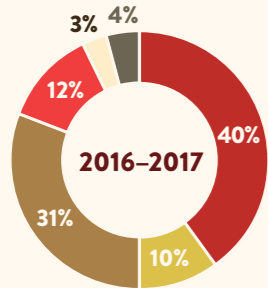
Partner Profile

While Hong Kong continues to be the primary donor demographic, ICM continues to diversify funding with support from international donors. Donations from Australia and the Philippines stayed relatively consistent; support from UK foundations grew significantly last year. Total cash donations increased by about 5% from US\$6.6M to US\$7M from 2016–2017 to 2017–2018. ICM continues to build diversity through new partnerships with international foundations and donors.

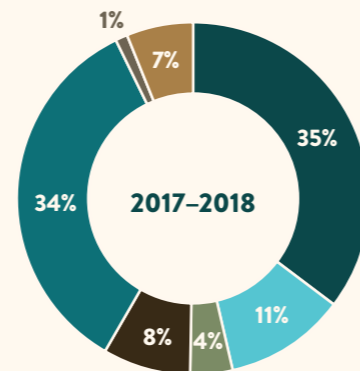
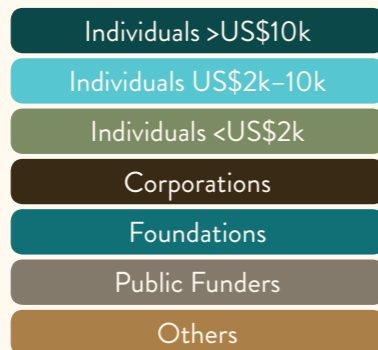
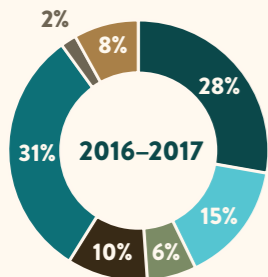
In-Kind Partners

An important aspect of ICM's work is our ability to provide people living in poverty with nutritious food and other essential resources. This is possible due to partnerships with other nonprofit organizations that share our values and vision. In 2017–2018, we distributed 44 containers with two million packages of fortified food, representing 12 million nutritious meals for the poor. We also received 228,000 bars of soap from Soap Cycling.

Food Partners

In 2017–2018, ICM distributed 44 shipping containers of food (almost 12 million meals) to ultrapoor families to help them provide better nutrition for their children. The highly nutritious food, specifically designed for malnourished children, was donated by four nonprofits: Feed My Starving Children, Rise Against Hunger, Kids Against Hunger and Harvest Pack.

While the food is donated, ICM incurs the cost of international shipping, customs fees, logistics and food storage as well as the land delivery costs to the geographically isolated, disadvantaged communities served. Philippine Span Asia Carrier Corporation partners with ICM by donating free domestic shipping within the Philippines.
